He is the author of To End All Segregation: The Politics of the Passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and he is the editor of The Civil Rights Act of 1964: The Passage of the Law that Ended Racial Segregation. He also wrote The Flawed Path to the Presidency 1992: Unfairness and Inequality in the Presidential Selection Process, as well as The Manipulated Path to the White House 1996: Maximizing Advantage in the Presidential Selection Process. His Colorado publications include The Flawed Path to the Governorship 1994: The Nationalization of a Colorado Statewide Election, and, with Thomas Cronin, Colorado Politics and Government: Governing the Centennial State. He also is the co-author of a high school civics text, American Government: We Are One.
