GUIDE TO COLORADO STATE SENATE ELECTIONS: 2022

Colorado state Senators are elected to a four-year term of office. Onehalf are elected in one even-year election and the other half in the evenyear election two-years later. Seventeen of the total 35 state Senate seats are up for election in 2022. The other 18 state Senate seats will come up for election in 2024.

Byron Pelton Republican open seat Sterling

This is the second most Republican seat in the Colorado state Senate. It is an open seat, and Byron Pelton of Sterling is the only Republican candidate and thus does not have a party primary election. There is no Democratic candidate in this race.


Nick Hinrichsen is an Army veteran who fought in the Iraq War and served with NATO peacekeeping operations in Kosovo and the Colorado National Guard.

He also worked alongside other local agencies and non-profits to help fund free rides throughout the school year for all Pueblo K-12 students.

TOM SULLIVAN - DEMOCRATIC



Tom Sullivan grew up the son of two veterans of the US Air Force, and while their service moved Tom around the globe during his childhood, he settled in Rochester, New York.

Upon completing high school, Tom entered the US Air Force in 1974 at the end of the Vietnam conflict and served as a crew chief on KC-135's until honorably discharge in 1977.

Tom married his high school sweetheart, Terry, a year later and in 1980 they moved to Colorado. Tom worked various jobs in the Denver metro area until 1986 when he was hired by the United State Postal Service (USPS). Tom used his GI Bill to get his degree at Metropolitan State College of Denver in 1988 in journalism and accounting and used that degree in his work with the American Postal Workers Union (APWU).

Tragedy struck Tom's family in the early morning hours of July 20, 2012. His son, Alex, was celebrating his 27th birthday with friends and co-workers at the Century Theater in Aurora and was one of the twelve who was murdered that night.

That life-changing night has led Tom down the path of advocating for victims rights and empowered him to speak up for working families in Colorado.

During the 5+ years since his son's murder and the recent completion of a nearly six-month trial, Tom has been involved with a myriad of concerns over that case. He has been personally involved in the judicial system, worked with law enforcement (both local and federal), a death-penalty case and victims of crime rights.

In 2018, Tom became the first Democrat elected to represent House District 37. In his first term in the State House, Rep. Sullivan sponsored Colorado's Extreme Risk Protection Order law, which is already saving lives across the state.

THOMAS KIM - REPUBLICAN



Tom Kim is the grandson of immigrants from Korea. He is a husband, father, and small business owner. As a small business owner, Tom

specializes in turning around struggling companies to help them improve their performance so they save jobs, build prosperity, and create opportunity for others. Tom's expertise in turning around struggling businesses will help with turning around our state.

Tom is running for Senate District 27 because as a father of two girls he is saddened the quality of life in Colorado has diminished. Crime and violent crime are the highest they've been in 20 years. Inflation is the highest it's been in 40 years. Gas prices are on the rise. Parents are being denied a voice in their children's education. We have been seeing opportunity dwindle right in front of us.
